## Before your visit

- Use the <u>www.dunwichmuseum.org.uk</u> and other resources to find out where Dunwich is and what the village is like today. Have a look at our downloads and see if there are any you would like the children to use. If you are using the Gingerbread sheet, practice it in the playground. Use images from our **Coastal Slideshow** on your whiteboard for interesting and informative historic and contemporary photographs and maps of the Dunwich coastline.

- Suggested topics to research for medieval life; types of jobs, housing, clothing, travel and transport, trade, technology, the use of seals, the social structure and the importance of the church and religion. This could be done through sorting pictures in a 'Medieval or Not' style game.
- In your literacy class you could give our Character scrolls to a group or groups of children, to study and hot seat characters at school or on the day of your visit.
- **Safety issues;** Before you go ensure that the children are aware of safety issues.

You must not go close to the edge of the cliff as it is extremely unstable and may be undercut.
